Women of the Arts

Women have always played important roles in the arts as muses, models, and patrons. But to focus on that is to obscure the many who have been artistic creators in their own right, not only today but going back centuries. This course will sample the work of well over a hundred female artists, writers, and composers. Set against their achievement, the role of women as inspirations for men becomes no more than a footnote.

Roger Brunyate is Artistic Director Emeritus of the Peabody Opera Theatre, which he led from 1980 to 2012. He holds degrees in English and Fine Arts from Cambridge, but made his career in opera, working at Glyndebourne, the Edinburgh Festival, the English Opera Group, and La Scala, Milan. Coming to America in 1972, he has run programs in Florida, Cincinnati, the Curtis Institute of Music, and Wolf Trap, besides directing here and abroad with such conductors as Mstislav Rostropovich and Yuri Temirkanov.

1952-1975 Dynamic Years of Change in America

We will discuss a wide range of topics on how America changed rapidly during 1950–1975 and focus on economic, political, military, international, and social themes. The class will cover the Baby Boom, the rapid growth of suburbia and the west coast, how farms decreased, and radio/ TV shows. We will explore technological developments leading to transistor radios, color TV, computers, and automobile and aerospace advances. We will have conversations on the Civil Rights movement, rights for minorities, gays and women, and how music, films, and sports changed during these years. Our class will cover five Presidents, their policies, and the growth of the conservative and liberal wings of the political parties. During these years anti-communism, the containment of communism, and superpower competition dominated American politics and military spending during the Cold War. We will review the widening Space Race, efforts to teach more science and modern math, and nuclear and conventional arms competition. We will discuss foreign policy issues including NATO, SEATO, Korea, Taiwan, Laos, the Vietnam War, protests, peace talks, the Draft, and openings to China and the USSR. Class members are encouraged to share their memories and experiences during these dynamic years to stimulate lively discussions.

Don Stanton, MA, was commissioned at Cornell University NROTC, served on ships off Vietnam, and flew as a P-3C Patrol Plane Commander and airline pilot. He was a Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense and chair of the Colorado Transportation Commission. Don holds an MA in National Security Studies from Georgetown University and wrote Looking Back at the Cold War: 30 Veterans and a Patrol Plane Commander Remember.
